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Biographical Notes

Victor Azarya is currently holder of the Rose Isaacs Chair in Sociology and also past chairman of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. His work on Africa includes *Aristocrats Facing Change: The Fulbe in Guinea, Nigeria, and Cameroon* as well as numerous articles on Fulbe history, traders and the state in pre-colonial West Africa, and state-society relations in contemporary Africa. He is also the author of *The Armenian Quarter of Jerusalem: Urban Life Behind Monastery Walls*, and has published extensively on ethnic communities and civil-military relations in Israel.

Paul Kazuhisa Eguchi has been an Associate Professor at the National Museum of Ethnology since 1976. His main interest is Fulfulde oral literature. His main field is Northern Cameroon where he has been working since 1967. He has published *Fulfulde Tales of Northern Cameroon I-IV*, *An English-Fulfulde Dictionary*, and several books and articles on the Fulbe and their oral traditions.

Charles Frantz (Ph.D. University of Chicago) is Emeritus Professor of the State University of New York in Buffalo, where he taught anthropology from 1968 to 89. His geographical fields of interest have been: British Columbia (1956-57), Zimbabwe (1958-60), and the Mbororo areas of Nigeria and Cameroon (1971-present). He was head of the Department of Sociology of Amadu Bello University, Zaria, in 1970-72. His main interest is inter-ethnic relations and national integration, and he has published many articles on these topics with reference to the Fulbe.

Shun'ya Hino is Professor of African Studies at the Institute for the Study of Languages and Cultures of Asia and Africa (ILCAA), Tokyo University of Foreign Studies. He has carried out comparative research on African urban societies, and on urban cultures such as the Swahili in East Africa and the Hausa-Fulbe in West Africa. His publications include several books and many articles on these peoples. He is also the editor of the series *African Urban Studies* and *African Languages and Ethnography*, published at ILCAA.

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Ryo Ogawa is an Associate Professor at the National Museum of Ethnology. He has been conducting research among the Fulbe-Jenngelbe of Senegal since 1974, especially on their world view and social organization. His publications include the book *To Live in the Sahel: Ethnography of a Fulbe Group in West Africa* (in Japanese), and the article, "Bodilessness" and Incongruity: Body Image and Its Social Dynamics among the Fulbe of Senegal (*Senri Ethnological Studies*), as well as many other articles on the Fulbe-Jenngelbe.

Christiane Seydou is Directeur de recherche at Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique (CNRS) and is teaching at Institut National des Langues et Civilisations Orientales (INALCO) in Paris. She received her Ph.D. from INALCO based on research on Fulbe literature. She has published *Silâmaka et Poullôri, Ham-Bodédio ou Hama le Rouge, Bergers des mots, Bibliographie générale du monde peul*, and many articles about Fulbe folktales. She is preparing *A Dictionary of Verbal Roots of Fulfulde (Fulfulde-French-English)*.

Yoshihito Shimada is currently Associate Professor in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Shizuoka University. In 1985 he received a Doctor of Ethnology from L'Ecole des Hautes Etudes. His doctoral thesis, based on field research in Northern Cameroon between November 1979 and November 1980, is titled: *Cité cosmopolite au Soudan Central—Capitale d'un lamidat du Nord-Cameroun*. Since 1986 he has also been conducting research in the inner delta of the Niger River in Mali. He has published several articles in French and Japanese based on this research. His more general interests include ethnological theory and methodology.

Catherine VerEecke (Ph.D., 1988, University of Pennsylvania) has been conducting anthropological research in Northern Nigeria since 1981, focusing on the Fulbe of the Adamawa Emirate. She has published articles on Fulbe women, Fulbe ethnicity and politics, and nomadic education in Nigeria, in such journals as *Ethnology* and *Ethnic Groups*. Currently a visiting research professor at the National Museum of Ethnology, she has served, beginning in 1988, as Assistant to the Director of the Center for African Studies of the Ohio State University.

Galina V. Zubko, a Doctor of Philology (Institute of African and Asian Countries, Moscow University), specializes in the language and culture of the Fulbe people, and has conducted research on African mythology and esoterism. She is currently working on a Fula-French Dictionary.

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
